The directors present their report and accounts for the year ended 31st March 2014.

#### Principal activities

The two main pieces of contract work this financial year were further woodland management on the Coppice in Accrington and a tree planting project with 25 schools in the borough of Hyndburn. The work on the Coppice in Accrington was for Hyndburn Borough Council and involved the thinning of 2.5 hectares of broadleaf woodland. The woodland had been planted in the 1970s/80s and this was the first thin. Ash trees had dominated and were suppressing other species. The thinning concentrated on the Ash trees to allow the other species, primarily Oak, Birch and Alder to establish themselves further. In addition we also manufactured bird boxes using our sawmill and Larch we felled previously and erected them throughout the woodland.

The tree planting project was carried out on behalf of Hyndburn Tree Wardens and involved the planting of nearly 300 standard fruit and native trees in primary and secondary 25 schools across the borough. This involved a lot of volunteer support and children from each school were encouraged to take part in the planting process. This was hugely successful and we received a lot of favourable feedback on the impact the project had. The aim of the scheme was to improve the biodiversity of the school grounds and to encourage the children to take a greater interest in trees and their place in the environment, hence the reason for planting fruit trees.

The work we undertook on the Coppice in Accrington was part of a wider scheme, run by the local borough council, to manage a public site for the benefit of the trees and to encourage greater access to the site by the public. This project included significant footpath improvements, seating and signage and has now become a much more widely used local resource within minutes of Accrington town centre.

During the year we worked entirely with volunteers on all our paid work. This involved a core team of about 10 dedicated volunteers and was supplemented as and when required, by more volunteers. During the year we worked with Accrington and Rossendale College students and also volunteers from Hyndburn Tree Warden group, Lancashire Wildlife trust and The PROSPECTS Foundation (Hyndburn's environmental charity).

In January 2014 we undertook another chainsaw training course for local volunteers. This course took place over the course of a week and involved four people. The course cost £1,580 and was paid for from our own reserves. In order to further support these volunteers we also paid £765 for, and supplied, personal protection equipment (Including chainsaw helmets, gloves, boot and trousers) to the individuals in order that they could make use of the training.

As an example of the volunteer support given during the financial year we have recorded 716 hours of volunteer support towards the work of Woody. Based on a volunteer figure of £7.50 per hour this totals £5,370 of volunteer support during 2013/14. This will be the minimum as volunteers have done other work that they have not recorded

Finally, as per our rules we stated that any surplus generated by our activities would be used for "Woodland development and woodland creation projects in the Borough of Hyndburn Also volunteer training and engagement activities linked to woodland projects in the Borough of Hyndburn."

Following the March 2014 year end we agreed to donate £1,000 to Lancashire Wildlife Trust towards the support and delivery of their conservation work on two local sites, Woodnook Vale and the Coppice/Peel Park/Arden Hall area. In addition, we also agreed to make a donation of £2,000 towards the work of the local Hyndburn Tree Warden group Both of these payments were made in the 2014/15 financial year. The remainder of our surplus was retained within the business to help grow and develop the business for future years.

We also sell bags of charcoal through two local outlets, the PROSPECTS Foundation (local environmental charity) and the One Planet shop (local community owned co-operative).
